


#### **USB 2.0 Ports**

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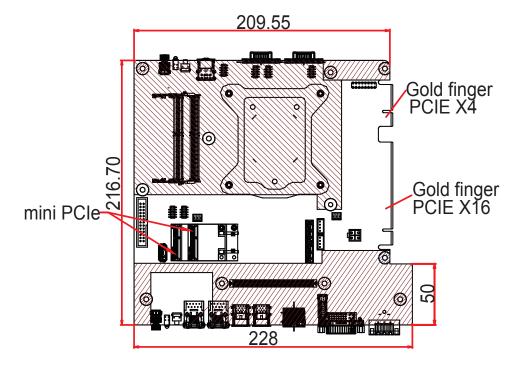

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# **Chapter 2 - Getting Started**

# **Preparing the System**

Before you start using the system, you need the following items:

- SATA hard drive
- AC power adapter
- Optical drive (for installing software/drivers)
- Memory module

### **Installing Devices**

The following are devices that can be installed in the system.

- Memory module
- SATA hard drives
- Mini PCIe and mSATA card
- CFast card

# **Configuring the BIOS**

To get you started, you may need to change configurations such as the date, time and the type of hard disk drive.

- 1. Power-on the system.
- 2. After the memory test, the message "Press DEL to run setup" will appear on the screen. Press the Delete key to enter the BIOS setup utility.

# **Installing an Operating System**

To install an OS, you need an optical drive or a USB flash drive and boot from such a device.

Make sure a 2.5" SATA drive is already installed.

- 1. Refer to the following chapters for information on installing a SATA drive.
- 2. Refer to your operating system manual for instructions on installing the operating system.

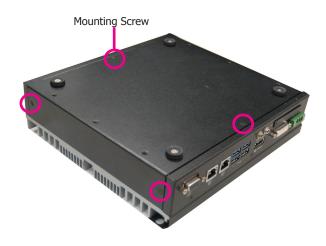

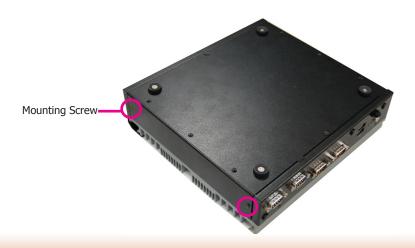

# **Chapter 3 - Installing the Devices**

# **Removing the Chassis Cover**

- 1. Make sure the system and all other peripherals connected to it have been powered off.
- 2. Disconnect all power cords and cables.
- The 6 mounting screws on the left and right sides and bottom of the system are used to secure the cover to the chassis. Remove these screws and put them in a safe place for later use.

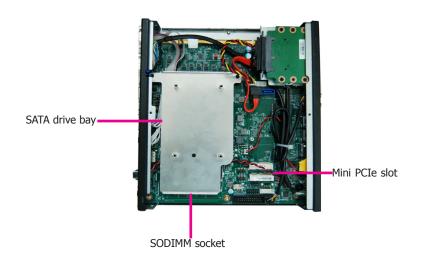




4. Lift the cover upward to open the system.





5. The SODIMM sockets, Mini PCIe slot and SATA drive bay are accessible after removing the chassis cover.



# **Installing a SODIMM**

The SODIMM sockets are located on the system board. Remove the SATA drive bay to access the SODIMM sockets.





2. Grasp the module by its edges and align the memory's notch with the socket's notch; then insert the memory into the socket at an angle and push it down until you feel a click.






- The system supports dual-channel configuration. To enable dual-channel, populate both SODIMM sockets.
- 2. The SODIMM sockets can only accept DDR4 memory modules. Please do not install other types of memory modules.

# **Installing a 2.5" SATA Drive**


 Before installing the SATA drive, connect the SATA data and power cable to the SATA data connector of the SATA drive. Then install the SATA drive on the HDD bracket with the provided mounting screws from the HDD drive bay kit.



2. Place the SATA drive installed with the HDD bracket in the system. Align the mounting holes on the HDD bracket with the mounting holes on the drive bay and use the provided mounting screws to secure the drive in place.



3. Connect the other end of the SATA data and power cable to the SATA data and power connectors on the system board respectively.

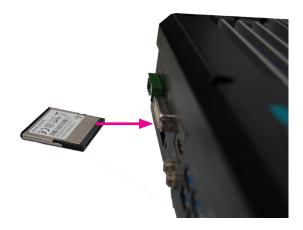


# **Installing a CFast Card**

1. Before installing a CFast card, take off the CFast card slot cover.



Gently insert the CFast card straight with the label on the CFast card facing up until you feel it lock into place. Do not force the card into the slot if the card is not correctly inserted.



3. Close the CFast card cover. To eject the card, push the card inward to release the lock and pull it out.

# **Installing a Mini PCIe or mSATA Card**

The system board is equipped with 2 Mini PCIe slots: one full-size and (PCIe/USB signals) and one half-size slot (USB/mSATA signals). Here we will demonstrate the installation of a full-size Mini PCIe card.

1. Grasp the Mini PCIe card by its edges and align the notch in the connector of the Mini PCIe card with the notch in the connector on the system board.



2. Push the Mini PCIe card down and use the provided mounting screw to secure the card on the system board.

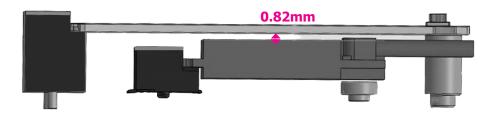


Mounting screw



#### Important:

The bottom side of a full-size Mini PCIe module should have a component height restriction of 0.82 mm and will sit flush against the connected half-size Mini PCIe module if such a component is used and the half-size slot is connected with a module.



### **Installing a CPU**

- 1. Make sure the system and all other peripheral devices connected to it have been powered-off.
- 2. Disconnect all power cords and cables.
- 3. Before installing the Intel CPU, remove the 8 mounting screws on the top of the system unit and put them in a safe place for later use.




4. The system board is equipped with a surface mount LGA 1151 socket. This socket is exclusively designed for installing a LGA 1151 packaged Intel CPU.



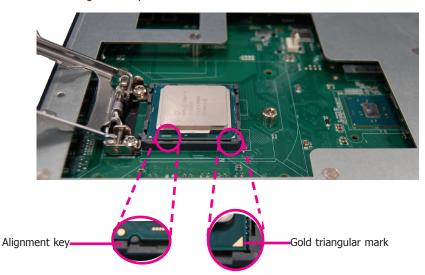
#### Important:

- 1. Before you proceed, make sure (1) the LGA 1151 socket comes with a protective cap, (2) the cap is not damaged and (3) the socket's contact pins are not bent. If the cap is missing or the cap or contact pins are damaged, contact your dealer immediately.
- 2. Keep the protective cap. RMA requests will be accepted and processed only if the LGA 1151 socket comes with the protective cap.
- 5. Unlock the socket by pushing the load lever down, move it sideways until it is released from the retention tab, and then lift the load lever up.

- Remove the protective cap from the CPU socket. The cap is used to protect the CPU socket against dust and harmful particles. Remove the protective cap only to install the CPU.
- 7. Insert the CPU into the socket. The gold triangular mark on the CPU must align with the corner of the CPU socket as the photo shown below.
- 8. Unlock the socket by pushing the load lever down and moving it sideways until it is released from the retention tab and then lift the load lever up.



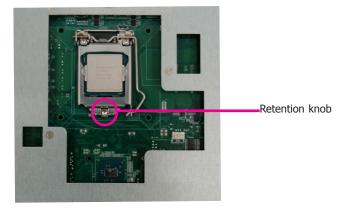
9. Insert the CPU into the socket. The gold triangular mark on the CPU must align with the corner of the CPU socket as shown below. The CPU's notch will at the same time fit into the socket's alignment key.






**Important:** The CPU will fit in only one orientation and can easily be inserted without exerting any force.

10. Close the load plate and push the load lever down to lock it under the retention tab. While closing the load plate, slide the front edge of the load plate under the retention tab.



# **Chapter 4 - Jumper Settings**

#### **Clear CMOS Data**




If you encounter the following conditions, you can reconfigure the system with the default values stored in the BIOS ROM.

- a) CMOS data becomes corrupted.
- b) You forgot the supervisor or user password.

To load the default values stored in the ROM BIOS, please follow these steps below:

- 1. Power-off the system and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Set the jumper pins 2 and 3 to On. Wait for a few seconds and set the jumper back to its default setting: 1-2 On.
- 3. Now plug the power cord and power on the system.

#### **Auto Power-on Select**




JP11 is used to select the method of powering on the system. If you want the system to power-on whenever AC power comes in, set JP11 pins 2 and 3 to On. If you want to use the power button, set pins 1 and 2 to On.

When using the JP11 "Power On" feature to power the system back on after a power failure, the system may not power on if the power lost is resumed within 5 seconds (power flicker).

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
# **COM1/COM2 RS232 Power Select**





JP3 (for COM1) and JP2 (for COM2) are used to configure serial COM ports to normal RS232 or RS232 with power. The pin assignments (Pin 1: optional 12V and Pin 9: optional 5V) of COM1 and COM2 will vary according to JP3's and JP2's setting respectively.

### COM1/COM2 RS232/422/485 Select



These jumpers allow you to configure the serial COM ports to RS232, RS422 (full duplex) or RS485. JP5, JP6 and JP12 are used to configure serial COM port 1. JP7, JP13 and JP14 are used to configure serial COM port 2. The pin functions of COM port 1 and COM port 2 will vary according to these jumpers' settings. Both COM1 and COM2 can be wired as either external ports or internal connectors. You can also configure the RS485 auto flow mechanism through the BIOS setup utility. For more information, refer to Chapter 7.






#### Note:

When COM1 RS232/422/485 is selected, JP5 and JP12 must be set in accordance to JP6. And when COM2 RS232/422/485 is selected, JP7 and JP14 must be set in accordance to JP13.

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# COM3/COM4 RS232/422/485 Select




These jumpers allow you to configure the serial COM ports to RS232, RS422 (full duplex) or RS485. JP8, JP9 and JP15 are used to configure serial COM port 3. JP4, JP10 and JP16 are used to configure serial COM port 4. The pin functions of COM port 3 and COM port 4 will vary according to these jumpers' settings. You can also configure the RS485 auto flow mechanism through the BIOS setup utility. For more information, refer to Chapter 7.




#### Note:

When COM3 RS232/422/485 is selected, JP8 and JP15 must be set in accordance to JP9. And when COM4 RS232/422/485 is selected, JP10 and JP16 must be set in accordance to JP4.





# **Front Panel I/O Ports**



The front panel I/O consists of the following ports:

- Power button with LED
- Reset button
- Remote power on/off switch connector
- Status and HDD LEDs
- Two USB 2.0 ports
- Four RS232 serial ports




The USB device allows data exchange between your computer and a wide range of simultaneously accessible external Plug and Play peripherals. In addition to the 2 USB 2.0 ports at the front panel, the system board provides 3 USB 2.0 ports through the internal pin headers.

#### BIOS Setting

Configure the onboard USB in the Advanced menu ("USB Configuration" submenu) of the BIOS. Refer to Chapter 7 for more information.

# **COM (Serial) Ports**



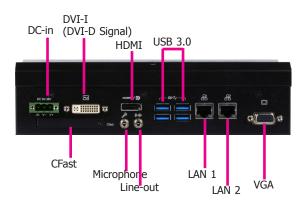
COM1 to COM4 can be selected among RS232, RS422 and RS485. In addition, COM1 and COM2 can be switched between normal RS232 and RS232 with power. For pin definitions and jumper selection of different communication modes, please refer to Chapter 4.

The serial ports are asynchronous communication ports with 16C550A-compatible UARTs that can be used with modems, serial printers, remote display terminals, and other serial devices.

#### BIOS Setting

Configure the serial ports in the Advanced menu ("Super IO Configuration" submenu) of the BIOS. You can use the BIOS setup utility to configure RS485 auto flow mechanism. Refer to Chapter 7 for more information.



#### **Features**

The LAN ports allow the system board to connect to a local area network with a network hub.


#### **BIOS Setting**

#### **Driver Installation**

Install the LAN drivers. Refer to Chapter 8 for more information.

### **Display Interfaces**



#### **VGA Port**

The VGA port is used for connecting a VGA monitor. Connect the monitor's 15-pin D-shell cable connector to the VGA port. After you plug the monitor's cable connector into the VGA port, gently tighten the cable screws to hold the connector in place.

#### DVI-I (DVI-D Signal) Port

The DVI-I (DVI-D Signal) port is used to connect a digital LCD monitor to transmit uncompressed digital video. This connector has a DVI-I receptacle but implements DVI-D signals (digital only).

Connect the display device's cable connector to the DVI-I port. After you plug the cable connector into the DVI-I port, gently tighten the cable screws to hold the connector in place.

#### **HDMI Port or DisplayPort**

The HDMI port which carries both digital audio and video signals is used to connect the HDMI port of an LCD monitor or a digital TV.



#### **USB Ports**




The USB device allows data exchange between your computer and a wide range of simultaneously accessible external Plug and Play peripherals. The system board is equipped with 4 USB 3.0 ports at the rear panel and 2 USB 2.0 ports at the front panel of the system unit. The USB 3.0 can transfer data up to 5 Gbps whereas the USB 2.0 can transfer data up to 480Mbps.



### 9~36V DC-in



This jack provides options of power input solution of 100W and 120W. Connect a DC power cord to this jack. Using a voltage higher than the recommended one may fail to boot the system or cause damage to the system board.



# **I/O Connectors**


### **Parallel Connector**



The 25-pin connector is used to connect the parallel port of a device such as a printer. It supports SPP, ECP and EPP standards.

SPP (Standard Parallel Port)	Allows normal speed operation but in one direction only.
ECP (Extended Capabilities Port)	Allows parallel port to operate in bidirectional mode and at a speed faster than the SPP's data transfer rate.
EPP (Enhanced Parallel Port)	Allows bidirectional parallel port operation at the maximum speed.

### **Front Panel Connector**



#### **HDD-LED - HDD LED**

This LED will be lit when the hard drive is being accessed.

#### **RESET SW - Reset Switch**

This switch allows you to reboot without having to power off the system.

#### **ATX-SW - ATX Power Switch**


This switch is used to power on or off the system.

#### PWR-LED - Power/Standby LED

When the system's power is on, this LED will be lit. When the system is in the S1 (POS - Power On Suspend) state, it will blink every second. When the system is in the S3 (STR - Suspend To RAM) state, it will blink every 4 seconds.

# **Chapter 7 - BIOS Setup**

# **Overview**

The BIOS is a program that takes care of the basic level of communication between the CPU and peripherals. It contains codes for various advanced features found in this system board. The BIOS allows you to configure the system and save the configuration in a battery-backed CMOS so that the data retains even when the power is off. In general, the information stored in the CMOS RAM of the EEPROM will stay unchanged unless a configuration change has been made such as a hard drive replaced or a device added.

It is possible that the CMOS battery will fail causing CMOS data loss. If this happens, you need to install a new CMOS battery and reconfigure the BIOS settings.



#### Note:

The BIOS is constantly updated to improve the performance of the system board; therefore the BIOS screens in this chapter may not appear the same as the actual one. These screens are for reference purpose only.

### **Default Configuration**

Most of the configuration settings are either predefined according to the Load Optimal Defaults settings which are stored in the BIOS or are automatically detected and configured without requiring any actions. There are a few settings that you may need to change depending on your system configuration.

### **Entering the BIOS Setup Utility**

The BIOS Setup Utility can only be operated from the keyboard and all commands are keyboard commands. The commands are available at the right side of each setup screen.

The BIOS Setup Utility does not require an operating system to run. After you power up the system, the BIOS message appears on the screen and the memory count begins. After the memory test, the message "Press DEL to run setup" will appear on the screen. If the message disappears before you respond, restart the system or press the "Reset" button. You may also restart the system by pressing the <Ctrl> <Alt> and <Del> keys simultaneously.

For your convenience, we will also provide you with an auto-execution file in the downloaded BIOS file. This auto-execution file will bring you directly to the flash utility menu soon after system boots up and finishes running the boot files in your boot disk.



# **Notice: BIOS SPI ROM**

- 1. The Intel® Management Engine has already been integrated into the system board. Due to safety concerns, the BIOS (SPI ROM) chip cannot be removed from this system board and used on another system board of the same model.
- 2. The BIOS (SPI ROM) on this system board must be the original equipment from the factory and cannot be used to replace one which has been utilized on other system boards.

# **Chapter 9 - RAID**

The system board allows configuring RAID on Serial ATA drives. It supports RAID 0 and RAID 1.

# **RAID Levels**

# **RAID 0 (Striped Disk Array without Fault Tolerance)**

RAID 0 uses two new identical hard disk drives to read and write data in parallel, interleaved stacks. Data is divided into stripes and each stripe is written alternately between two disk drives. This improves the I/O performance of the drives at different channel; however it is not fault tolerant. A failed disk will result in data loss in the disk array.

# **RAID 1 (Mirrored Disk Array with Fault Tolerance)**

RAID 1 copies and maintains an identical image of the data from one drive to the other drive. If a drive fails to function, the disk array management software directs all applications to the other drive since it contains a complete copy of the drive's data. This enhances data protection and increases fault tolerance to the entire system. Use two new drives or an existing drive and a new drive but the size of the new drive must be the same or larger than the existing drive.

RAID Level	Min. Drives	Protection	Description
RAID 0	2	None	Data striping without redundancy
RAID 1	2	Single Drive Failure	Disk mirroring

# **Settings**

To enable the RAID function, the following settings are required.

- 1. Connect the Serial ATA drives.
- 2. Enable Serial ATA in the Insyde BIOS.
- 3. Create a RAID volume.
- 3-1. Create a RAID volume if the boot type is UEFI.
- 4. Install the Intel Rapid Storage Technology Utility.

# **Step 1: Connect the Serial ATA Drives**

Refer to Chapter 3 for details on connecting the Serial ATA drives.



# **Important:**

- 1. Make sure you have installed the Serial ATA drives and connected the data cables otherwise you won't be able to enter the RAID BIOS utility.
- Treat the cables with extreme caution especially while creating RAID. A damaged cable will ruin the entire installation process and operating system. The system will not boot and you will lost all data in the hard drives. Please give special attention to this warning because there is no way of recovering back the data.

# **Step 2: Enable RAID in the Insyde BIOS**

- 1. Power-on the system then press <Del> to enter the main menu of the BIOS setup utility.
- 2. Go to "Advanced" menu, and select the "SATA Configuration" menu.
- 3. Change the "SATA Mode Selection" to "RAID" mode.
- 4. Save the changes in the "Save & Exit" menu.
- 5. Reboot the system.

# **Step 3: Create a RAID Volume**

- 1. When the Intel® RST option ROM status screen displays during POST, press <Ctrl> and <I> simultaneously to enter the option ROM user interface.
- 2. Select 1: Create RAID Volume and press <Enter>.
- 3. Use the up or down arrow keys to select the RAID level and press <Enter>.
- 4. Use the up or down arrow keys to select the strip size and press <Enter>.
- 5. Press <Enter> to select the physical disks.
- Use the up or down arrow keys to scroll through the list of hard drives and press <Space> to select the drive.
- 7. Press <Enter>.
- 8. Select the volume size and press <Enter>. You must select less than one hundred percent of the available volume space to leave space for the second volume.
- 9. Press <Enter> to create the volume.
- 10. At the prompt, press <Y> to confirm volume creation.
- 11. Select 4: Exit and press <Enter>.
- 12. Press <Y> to confirm exit.



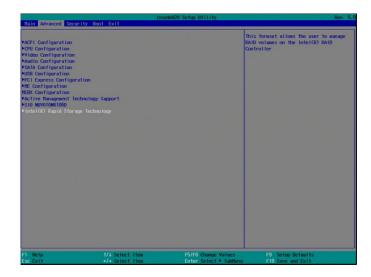

# **Appendix A - Troubleshooting Checklist**

# **Troubleshooting Checklist**

This chapter of the manual is designed to help you with problems that you may encounter with your personal computer. To efficiently troubleshoot your system, treat each problem individually. This is to ensure an accurate diagnosis of the problem in case a problem has multiple causes.

Some of the most common things to check when you encounter problems while using your system are listed below.

- 1. The power switch of each peripheral device is turned on.
- 2. All cables and power cords are tightly connected.
- 3. The electrical outlet to which your peripheral devices are connected is working. Test the outlet by plugging in a lamp or other electrical device.
- 4. The monitor is turned on.
- 5. The display's brightness and contrast controls are adjusted properly.
- 6. All add-in boards in the expansion slots are seated securely.
- 7. Any add-in board you have installed is designed for your system and is set up correctly.

# **Monitor/Display**

## If the display screen remains dark after the system is turned on:

- 1. Make sure that the monitor's power switch is on.
- 2. Check that one end of the monitor's power cord is properly attached to the monitor and the other end is plugged into a working AC outlet. If necessary, try another outlet.
- Check that the video input cable is properly attached to the monitor and the system's display adapter.
- 4. Adjust the brightness of the display by turning the monitor's brightness control knob.

## The picture seems to be constantly moving.

- 1. The monitor has lost its vertical sync. Adjust the monitor's vertical sync.
- Move away any objects, such as another monitor or fan, that may be creating a magnetic field around the display.
- 3. Make sure your video card's output frequencies are supported by this monitor.

### The screen seems to be constantly wavering.

1. If the monitor is close to another monitor, the adjacent monitor may need to be turned off. Fluorescent lights adjacent to the monitor may also cause screen wavering.

# **Power Supply**

### When the computer is turned on, nothing happens.

- 1. Check that one end of the AC power cord is plugged into a live outlet and the other end properly plugged into the back of the system.
- 2. Make sure that the voltage selection switch on the back panel is set for the correct type of voltage you are using.
- The power cord may have a "short" or "open". Inspect the cord and install a new one if necessary.

# **Floppy Drive**

### The computer cannot access the floppy drive.

- 1. The floppy diskette may not be formatted. Format the diskette and try again.
- 2. The diskette may be write-protected. Use a diskette that is not write-protected.
- 3. You may be writing to the wrong drive. Check the path statement to make sure you are writing to the targeted drive.
- There is not enough space left on the diskette. Use another diskette with adequate storage space.

# **Hard Drive**

### Hard disk failure.

- 1. Make sure the correct drive type for the hard disk drive has been entered in the BIOS.
- 2. If the system is configured with two hard drives, make sure the bootable (first) hard drive is configured as Master and the second hard drive is configured as Slave. The master hard drive must have an active/bootable partition.

### **Excessively long formatting period.**

If your hard drive takes an excessively long period of time to format, it is likely a cable connection problem. However, if your hard drive has a large capacity, it will take a longer time to format.

# **Serial Port**

# The serial device (modem, printer) doesn't output anything or is outputting garbled characters.

- 1. Make sure that the serial device's power is turned on and that the device is on-line.
- 2. Verify that the device is plugged into the correct serial port on the rear of the computer.
- 3. Verify that the attached serial device works by attaching it to a serial port that is working and configured correctly. If the serial device does not work, either the cable or the serial device has a problem. If the serial device works, the problem may be due to the onboard I/O or the address setting.
- 4. Make sure the COM settings and I/O address are configured correctly.

# **Keyboard**

### Nothing happens when a key on the keyboard was pressed.

- 1. Make sure the keyboard is properly connected.
- Make sure there are no objects resting on the keyboard and that no keys are pressed during the booting process.

# **System Board**

- 1. Make sure the add-in card is seated securely in the expansion slot. If the add-in card is loose, power off the system, re-install the card and power up the system.
- 2. Check the jumper settings to ensure that the jumpers are properly set.
- 3. Verify that all memory modules are seated securely into the memory sockets.
- 4. Make sure the memory modules are in the correct locations.
- If the board fails to function, place the board on a flat surface and seat all socketed components. Gently press each component into the socket.
- 6. If you made changes to the BIOS settings, re-enter setup and load the BIOS defaults.
